


## SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

As a district we continually look for areas that we need to adapt and change to meet the needs of our students and the ever changing job market. During the 20132014 school year, we implemented Project Lead the Way (PLTW) at the high school to help increase student learning in the area of Science Technology Engineering and Math (STEM). The district has continued to expand this program through the last several years.
PLTW is an instructional program that encourages students' thinking in the area of STEM. This program is a comprehensive curriculum that encourages our students to think critically, creativity, and apply real-world problem solving. We have been using this program in our secondary course offerings and continue to look for ways to expand this program. Recently we integrated PLTW concepts into our fifth and sixth grade technology literacy courses, which adds a new computer science component for our middle school students.
This PLTW program aligns with our 5-12 vision, because it allows our students to apply the knowledge and skills they are learning to life outside of the classroom walls. We have secured partnerships with John Deere, Corteva and HyVee in the areas of agriscience, math, technology and engineering to help students learn how the skills they are using inside the classroom can be applied to their future careers. Student exposure to job opportunities earlier in their education opens access to careers in fields which can potentially help them find a passion and a desire to work in areas they did not know even existed.
I am thrilled about the new opportunities we are creating for our students. I understand that true student engagement occurs when students find purpose and meaning between what we teach in school and their lived experiences. I am confident that the expansion of PLTW is one way we are providing that link to bring transformative learning experiences for the students at DCG.

## MIDDLE SCHOOL

Math Unit Sixth graders recently learned to build houses in math class. They didn't use lumber and nails, but created the houses mostly of cardboard and paper. The recent activity was an extension of a geometry and area unit. Students were challenged to build a two story home around 1500 square feet. They had to include at least two bedrooms, a kitchen, one bathroom, a living room, garage and getting to the second story had to be functional. Once students had their structures completed they needed to calculate the scaled square footage of each room in
 their house. Then they calculated their estimated cost of building the house. After completion, students calculated the cost of the house with interest after receiving a bank loan. All calculations were used on present day pricing which the students researched. Students worked together in teams to complete their houses. This was a great hand on learning experience for the students and an example of a cross curricular activity where students can not only use their math skills but analytical, critical thinking, reading and teamwork skills all in one.

## ELEMENTARY



Book TastingNorth Ridge first graders got to experience a book tasting in the classroom. Their room was transformed into "Starbooks" complete with dining tables and menus. The menus included books that fell into different genres. The genres included; graphic novels, controlled readers, chapter books, fairy tales, picture books and nonfiction. Students were instructed to look at the cover, read the title, take a picture walk through the book, read a few pages and write a review on what they sampled. Students got to rate the book based on their interest level and kept their review sheets so when they go to the library or have free reading time they can select books they are interested in.

## Black History Month

 Second graders spent all month learning about the significance of Black History Month. After learning about several important African American figures, Heritage second graders worked with a partner to research African American leaders. They are creating a "notecatcher" where they will be recording facts and putting together a timeline of their person's life.

## Stock Market Challenge

The competition consisted of each student taking a 100 question exam based on marketing, management, entrepreneurship, and finance concepts.
